What is an ADRC?

The Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) is a public office where people can find help in their communities for older people and adults with disabilities, as well as their families and friends. Our staff is available to answer your questions and help you explore all of your options. Free, private, confidential meetings with our staff are available at the resource center, over the telephone, or in a visit to your home.

What we do:

- Benefits counseling – Accurate and current information on private and government benefits and programs. “Red tape cutters” on problems related to Medicare, Social Security, and other benefits.
- Equipment loan closet – Short term use of commodes, bath benches, walkers, wheelchairs, etc.
- Family caregiver services – Consultation with individuals and families, support group, respite programs, Daybreak adult day care, educational materials.
- Health & Wellness Programs – Healthy living programs, falls prevention workshops, monthly nutrition workshops, and caregiver support workshops.
- Incontinence supplies
- Information and connections – Answers to questions and assistance in locating needed help.
- Informational lending library – Books, CDs, tapes, pamphlets, brochures.
- Liquid nutritional supplements – Available at reduced prices to adults who have a doctor’s or dietitian’s order for the products.
- Long-term care options counseling – Consultation and advice about the options available to meet an individual’s long-term care needs, including enrollment into long term care options (Family Care and IRIS).
- Meals-on-Wheels – Meals are delivered to homebound adults age 60+ and includes a check on their well-being. Suggested donation: \$3.25. Dining at Five suggested donation is \$5.00.
- Medicare/supplemental insurance counseling – Help seniors with filing claims, solving claim errors, appealing decisions, and understanding and comparing supplemental health insurance policies.
- Private-pay caregiver hiring – Families needing to hire a caregiver can review job applications completed by caregivers seeking work. Families use their private funds to directly pay caregivers.
- Senior dining – Healthy, appetizing meals served at senior centers. Opportunity for networking, visiting with friends, volunteering. Suggested donation: \$3.25.
- Tax-aide – Help with filing Wisconsin Homestead Tax and income tax returns.
- Transportation – Information about transportation choices and volunteer drivers.
- Youth Transition Services-Information about resources available when youth with disabilities reach adulthood.

Caregiver Services

You are a caregiver if you are a spouse, adult child, other relative or friend who helps care for, or is concerned about an older adult or a person with a disability. Caregiving is a two-sided coin. Amidst the joy of helping someone else, there may also be feelings of stress, frustrations, guilt, and a concern about how you are going to handle future caregiving needs.

The ADRC of Barron, Rusk & Washburn Counties offers professional, unbiased information about supportive services and options that can assist you – the caregiver- and the person you are caring for.

Here are some of the services we offer:

- **Support Groups** - These groups provide a great opportunity for caregivers and family members to share and learn from others experiencing similar frustrations and concerns. Occasionally, speakers are brought in to provide valuable information and resources.
- **Powerful Tools for Caregiver Classes** - This six week course is designed specifically for the caregiver to teach important tools to help reduce stress, improve communications, master emotions and communicate in challenging situations.
- **Adult Day Care** - A day time social program for those with memory loss and confusion that provides safety, stimulation, and engagement with others. Please see brochure for full details.
- **National Family Caregiver and Alzheimer Family & Caregiver Support Programs** - Limited financial assistance is available annually to individuals providing care to others. Call us for more information about this program and status of the funds.
- **Information and Assistance** - We offer office, in-home and phone consultation about community resources and options available to you. These include respite care, financial resources and care options as well as information about ways to reduce stress and take care of you.
- **Caregiver Outreach Presentations** - Community presentations can be scheduled on issues related to caregiving to help raise awareness and educate the public about available resources.
- **Resource Library** - A variety of books, brochures and DVDs are available for check out. Topics range from caregiver wellness to specific health conditions related information

Choosing the Right Assisted Living Facility

Assisted Living facilities offer housing alternatives for older adults or adults with disabilities who may need help with dressing, bathing, eating, and toileting, but do not require the intensive medical and nursing care provided in a nursing home.

How to Choose a Facility

Begin by thinking about what is important to you or your loved one:

- Do you prefer to live with a lot of people or a few people?
- Do you want a private bathroom?
- Do you have Alzheimer's or dementia?

Narrow down your search:

- Do you want a facility in a particular town, close to friends and family?
- Can the facility provide the level of services that you need?

Schedule a tour of facilities that you are interested in:

- Visit each facility more than once, sometime unannounced.
- Visit at meal times, sample the food, and observe the quality of mealtime services.
- Observe interactions among residents and staff.
- Check to see if the facility offers social, recreational, spiritual activities.
- Talk to residents.
- Learn what staffing level they are and what training staff receive.
- Is there a waiting list?

Find out if the facility you are considering has received any citations:

- Contact the Division of Quality Assurance at 800-642-6552.
- Ask the facility if they have received any citations.

Disability Benefit Specialist Program

What is a Disability Benefit Specialist?

A Disability Benefit Specialist (DBS) works with individuals who are between the ages of 18 and 59 and have physical disabilities, developmental disabilities, and/or mental illness and counsels them about public or private benefits. DBS staff are trained by attorneys from Disability Rights of Wisconsin.

Who should seek help from a Disability Benefit Specialist?

- Persons who want to know more about private or public benefits.
- Persons who need help with or information about applying for benefits.
- Persons who have been denied a benefit which they think they are entitled to.

What can a Disability Benefit Specialist help you with?

- Social Security Disability Income (SSDI)
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Information about private health and disability insurance
- Medical Assistance
- Medicare A, B, C, and D
- Medicare Supplement Insurance
- Patient Assistance Drug Programs
- Other benefit needs and issues

Do Not Resuscitate Order, and Bracelet

Wisconsin passed a statute in 1996 as part of WI Act 2000 regarding “Do Not Resuscitate” (DNR) orders. A DNR order is signed by a physician to direct emergency medical service providers not to attempt cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on a patient. It is standard emergency medical practice to perform CPR on all persons found to be in cardiac or respiratory arrest.

A DNR order may be issued in certain circumstances if a patient with a qualifying medical condition requests that CPR not be done. This decision is made by the patient and their physician after discussing future treatment options. A special DNR bracelet informs first responders, EMT’s, paramedics, and emergency room personnel not to attempt CPR when a patient is wearing an approved bracelet. These statutes only apply to the emergency personnel noted above, who are primarily pre-hospital and emergency department health care providers; they do not control DNR orders for inpatient hospital or other inpatient settings.

Your attending physician is the only person who may issue a DNR order for you. The order is signed only if a qualified patient requests and signs the DNR order. A person who has a DNR order is then identified by a special DNR bracelet. The bracelet is placed on the person’s wrist by the physician or someone designated to do so. Family members cannot be given bracelets to put on the person.

DNR bracelets must be honored unless the patient revokes the order, or the bracelet appears to be damaged or tampered with. If a bracelet falls off, is damaged, or is not readable, it can be replaced as long as a signed order is in your medical record.

Elder Benefit Specialist Program

What is an Elder Benefit Specialist?

Elder Benefit Specialists provide information, assistance, and advocacy to Wisconsin residents age 60 or older on a broad range of benefit programs. They provide information and support in areas such as program eligibility criteria, applying for benefits, appealing benefit denials or incorrect benefit amounts, consumer debt, landlord/tenant law, and private insurance. Elder Benefit Specialists receive on-going training, support and supervision from attorneys at the Greater Wisconsin Area on Aging Resources.

Who should seek help from an Elder Benefit Specialist?

- People 60 or over who want to know more about private and public benefits.
- People 60 or over who need help in applying for benefits.
- People 60 or over who have been denied a benefit that they think they are entitled to receive.

How can an Elder Benefit Specialist help?

- They can provide you with accurate and current information on your benefits.
- They can provide advocacy on your behalf with other parties.
- They can provide you with explanations and possible solutions to issues related to your benefits.

Elderly Nutrition Programs

The purpose of the Elderly Nutrition Program is to reduce hunger and food insecurity, to promote socialization of older adults, and to promote the health and well-being of older individuals. Everyone age 60 and older is welcome to participate. Good nutrition helps you think better, fight illness, and have more energy. Getting started on the path to good nutrition is easier than you think.

Here are some of the services we offer:

- Senior Dining - Dining with others can improve your appetite. Scratch cooking, coffee and great company are a few more reasons to give it a try. See the Senior Centers/Senior Dining section for detailed information.
- Meals on Wheels - If you are stuck at home and having a hard time cooking, Meals on Wheels will provide that same delicious meal, delivered with a smile. Maybe you need them during recovery and maybe you need them long-term, these meals are the “little bit of help” you need to stay independent.
- Liquid Nutritional Supplements - Sometimes a little extra is needed to build your strength. Supplements are available at reduced cost with a prescription from a doctor or dietician.
- Beneficial Bites - Need some “easy-to-digest” nutrition information? More importantly, need some reliable information? Your ADRC nutrition staff can help. Nutrition education sessions are regularly offered throughout the county so look for them.
- Commodity Supplemental Food Program - Serves people 60+ in Barron County, who meet income guidelines. Boxes of food containing cereal, juice, milk, canned fruits & vegetables, meat, pasta/rice, and cheese are distribute monthly.

Healthy Living Programs

- **Beneficial Bites**

Free educational sessions about different foods provided at several community/senior centers in Barron County. These sessions provide information about the health benefits of the featured food, along with important details about selection, storage and preparation of the food. Food samples and recipes are also part of every session.

- **Healthy Living with Diabetes**

Increase confidence and develop techniques to deal with the symptoms of diabetes and improve blood sugar readings. Learn about appropriate exercise healthy eating strategies a, dealing with difficult emotions, stress reduction techniques, and preventing complications. This is a 6-week workshop.

- **Living Well with Chronic Conditions, Put Life Back Into Your Life!**

A 6-week workshop designed to help those with ongoing health conditions build confidence in their ability to manage their health and maintain active and fulfilling lives.

- **Powerful Tools for Caregivers**

A 6-week course designed specifically for the caregiver to teach important tools to help reduce stress, improve communications, master emotions and communicate in challenging situations.

- **Stepping On: Building Confidence and Reducing Falls**

A 7-week workshop for adults age 60 and over. Learn strength and balance exercises, the role vision plays in keeping balance, how medications can contribute to falls, what to look for in safe footwear, and home hazards

Home Care Services

Home care services are designed to help individuals remain living at home and in their communities for as long as they desire. Costs range between \$10-\$30/hour.

Who Should Consider Home Care Services?

- Older adults with support needs
- Individuals with a disability who have care needs
- People recovering from an illness, surgery or hospital stay

Types of Home Care Services Available:

- Skilled Care – health care services, physical therapy, medical social work
- Personal Care Services – bathing, dressing
- Supportive Services – house cleaning, meal preparation, laundry, etc.

Tips for Hiring A Home Care Provider:

- Interview providers in person
- Ask for references
- Ensure a criminal background check has been completed for staff
- Document a plan for services to be provided
- Make billing/payment arrangements
- Check availability for services on off-hours or weekends as necessary

Questions to Ask When Hiring a Home Care Provider:

- How long has the agency been in business?
- What training does the staff have?
- Are the caregivers and/or agency certified or licensed by the state?
- Are the caregivers insured?
- What is the minimum time your agency requires for the service?

Housing and Care Options

The following describes the various options available to individuals who need supportive services in their place of residence. Choice of a suitable alternative depends on a number of factors, including lifestyle preferences, the level of support needed, cost, and the options available in a particular community. Some of the options are subject to government regulation, while others are not.

In Home Care

Care services can be provided to individuals in their own home or apartment. Homemaker, chore services, home delivered meals, home health care, attendant care, and transportation are some of the services that make it possible for people with long term care needs to remain in their homes. These can be arranged through public social service agencies, purchased from private agencies, or provided by family and friends. While most services are unregulated, home health agencies are licensed by the state.

Senior and Disabled Housing/Independent Living Apartments

This housing is multi-unit rental housing that is specially designed for, and marketed to elderly and disabled tenants. Most offer studio and/or one bedroom apartments and some have a recreation room or other common space for social gatherings. There may be a manager available to make referrals or organize events. Tenants may individually arrange for supportive services from outside providers, as with any in-home care. No license or special regulation is required for the facility.

Residential Care Apartment Complex (RCAC)

RCACs combine apartment housing with supportive, personal and nursing services. Residents have their own apartments, including full bath and kitchen facilities, and retain control over their personal space, care decisions and daily routines. Services are individually tailored to each resident's capacities and preferences and are adjusted as necessary to avoid requiring people to move if they need more help. Facilities may provide up to 28 hours of service per resident per week. RCACs are either registered or certified. Certified facilities are monitored by the state and eligible to receive Medical Assistance waiver funding, registered facilities will not.

Adult Family Home (AFH)

An adult family home is a residence where one to four unrelated adults live and receive meals, supervision, and personal care. Many adult family homes, especially those with only one or two paying residents, are private homes where elderly or people with disabilities live with a foster family. Adult family homes caring for one or two unrelated adults are certified by a local managed care organization; homes caring for three or four residents are licensed and regulated by the state.

Community Based Residential Facility (CBRF)

CBRFs are staffed group living arrangements that provide room, board, supervision and other supportive services to five or more unrelated residents. Typically, residents have a private or shared sleeping room and share living, dining, and bathroom space with other residents of the facility. CBRFs are intended for people who cannot live independently but are neither acutely ill nor need extensive amounts of nursing care. Facilities vary in size from five residents to over 100. Some are houses, others are facilities. Some serve a frail elderly population; others serve people with disabilities, people with Alzheimer's disease, or mixed group of residents. All CBRFs are licensed by the state.

Nursing Home

A nursing home is a health care facility which provides room, board, and 24 hour care. Residents may be admitted for a short-term stays or for long-term care for chronic conditions. Nursing homes are licensed by the state. Most are also certified for Medicare and Medicaid, which provide public funds to cover the cost of care for eligible residents.

Living Will/Power of Attorney

As a competent adult, you have the right to make your own health care decisions. However, you could become incapacitated at any time by an accident, illness or debilitating condition that could lead to your loss of ability to express your wishes about medical treatment. For this reason, it is important for you to plan for future health care decisions. An advance directive is a legal document that allows you to make your health care desires and preferences known.

An advance directive includes written instructions recognized under state law by which you communicate your health care preferences. There are many different terms used to describe advance directives.

The written advance directives recognized by Wisconsin law are:

- Power of Attorney for Health Care (POAHC)
- Declaration to Physicians (known in Wisconsin as Living Will)

Completing either of these documents is voluntary. They are “valid” once they have been completed, properly witnessed and signed. It is important to know that you continue to make your own health care decisions as long as you are able. A Power of Attorney for Health Care becomes effective when two physicians, or one physician and one psychologist, personally examine you and sign a certificate that you are “incapacitated” to make health care decisions. A Living Will becomes effective when you are either in a “persistent vegetative state” or have a terminal illness with death imminent. Two physicians must certify that one of these conditions exists.

Long Term Care

Long term care programs, such as Family Care & IRIS, provide services and supports to eligible adults to meet their long term care needs, allowing them to maintain independence and choice in their lives.

Current long term care programs are designed to promote:

- Access – creating a setting where people are able to receive the services they need when they need them.
- Choice – allowing individuals to choose where and how they receive their care.
- Quality – ensuring that services meet an individual’s needs and provide for a good quality of life.
- Cost-effectiveness – assure a sustainable future.

Am I eligible?

- You must be a resident of the county in which you are applying.
- You must be elderly or have a physical or developmental disability.
- You must be found functionally eligible through a long term care functional screen.
- You must be financially eligible.

How to apply or receive additional information:

Contact the Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Barron, Rusk & Washburn Counties and ask to speak with an Information & Assistance Specialist. ADRC’s are the single point of entry for providing information and options about long term care programs as well as determining eligibility. An Information & Assistance Specialist will meet with you to determine your eligibility for long term care programs as well as assistance with the enrollment process.

Nursing Home Relocation

Do you reside in a nursing home, but would prefer to live elsewhere?

For individuals that are residing in a nursing home the Community Relocation Initiative (CRI) may enable you to move to a different setting where you can receive the services that you need. Alternative settings can include your home/apartment or assisted living facility.

Am I eligible?

- You must reside in a nursing home and have long term care needs.
- Your nursing home stay is currently paid for by Wisconsin Medicaid.
- You must be 65 years of age or older or have a disability.

How to receive additional information:

Contact the social worker at the nursing home and ask for a referral to the Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Barron, Rusk & Washburn Counties. An Information & Assistance Specialist will meet with you to determine your eligibility.

When Should a Person Quit Driving?

There is no specific age at which a person can be considered too old to drive, as long as he or she remains healthy and if the declines that take place in the senses and other capabilities are normal. However, because our driver's license carries the greatest responsibility that each of us will ever have, we need to ask ourselves some questions regardless of age.

- Do I have memory problems?
- Am I sometimes afraid to drive?
- Do I feel aggressive when I drive?
- Do I have trouble with my vision? Especially at night?
- Do I have trouble hearing?
- Do I take medication that causes drowsiness, or stimulates?
- Do others honk their horn at me for no reason?
- Do I have difficulty with heavy interstate traffic?
- How can I improve my driving skills?

Youth Transition Services Information

For students with disabilities, the Aging & Disability Resource Center is a vital link or “Bridge” between school and community in order to experience the adult world at its best!

The ADRC can assist in answering questions you may have such as:

- Where can I live after high school?
- Can I make my own healthy meals?
- Can I afford to live on my own?
- How am I going to get around town?
- What will I do for a job?
- Do I need assistance with handling my money?
- Do I need help making legal decisions?

How can the Aging & Disability Resource Center help you?

The ADRC can provide:

- Assistance, advocacy and eligibility for Long Term Care services at age 17 years, 6 months old.
- The tools necessary to assist with choices, right and future planning into adult programs and services after high school.
- Information on Guardianship, Power of Attorney for health, and Representative Payee.
- Direction and assistance in understanding your benefits such as Social Security and Medicaid.
- A review of vocational services and programs for future employment, whether part time or full time.
